FREE HOME SAFETY VISITS TO BE OFFERED IN JUNE

Jim Resnick, Program Manager for Senior Outreach & Education of the Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Service, returned to Meet & Mingle on May 10, to discuss Maryland's new smoke alarm law, which goes into effect **January 1, 2018**. Chief Fitzgerald of the Chevy Chase Village Police was also on hand, and together they provided a wealth of important home safety information.

The new smoke alarm law will require that all battery-only operated smoke alarms must be replaced with units powered by sealed-in, 10-year long-life batteries. Even in these devices THE SENSORS ONLY HAVE A 10 YEAR LIFE and must be replaced every 10 years.

During the month of June, Jim Resnick is partnering with Chevy Chase At Home to offer a FREE home safety visit to ALL SENIORS in our community as a public service. The home visit by Jim (or in some cases another firefighter, accompanied by a CC@ H volunteer, will cover numerous aspects of home safety, including noting the safest exit in case of an emergency and a visual check for potential fire hazards with suggestions for improvements or corrections, if needed, provided in writing.

What homeowners MAY also receive are: 1) upgrade of smoke detectors and carbon monoxide meters, as needed to comply with the new law, 2) assistance with changing batteries in existing detectors,

CC@ H Expands Service Area

For the first time since 2012, Chevy Chase At Home will be expanding its service area. At the beginning of 2012, CC@ H extended its service area to include Rollingwood and the Old Hamlet. At its May meeting, held on May 10, the CC@ H Board of Directors voted to approve a recommendation from the Membership Committee that Chevy Chase West and the Village of Drummond be added to the area CC@ H serves. The recommendation and decision followed a survey of residents of those communities which showed a considerable interest in membership in CC@ H and, perhaps of even greater importance, in volunteering.

Enough volunteers from those areas need to be trained before services can be provided to Full Members. An ad hoc committee will examine ways to implement the Board decision.

Naomi's Benches: A Memorial to a Dedicated Activist

In the summer of 2012, Naomi Kaminsky, CC@ H President and Town of Chevy Chase resident, persuaded the Town Council to place comfortable benches in attractive locations for walkers to rest for a few minutes. The Council responded to her request with the installation of five benches, and more recently, at the request of Chevy Chase At Home, also graciously affixed a memorial plaque to each one. On Wednesday, April 13, more than 30 friends and neighbors, including the Town Council and CC@ H members, gathered at the Town Hall with Irving Kaminsky and Kate Kaminsky Murphy to unveil the plaque on the bench nearest to the Town Hall and then shared a few moments recalling Naomi's joyful spirit and her many contributions to our community.

Where are these benches located? Near the Town Hall/Lawton Center at the sidewalk extension of Willow at Leland; on Lynn Drive at the entrance to the Capital Crescent Trail (near the walkway between Lynn Drive and Tarrytown Road); in Zimmerman Park near Maple and Blackthorn; at the triangle where Virgilia and Meadow meet; and at the NE corner of Meadow Lane and Rosemary. On a beautiful day, why not take a walk around the Town and stop at one or more of these benches, sit, and enjoy the beauty (and in most cases, the solitude) around you, and remember our good friend Naomi.

Mary Levering's 45-year Stint at the Library of Congress!

At the April 12 Meet and Mingle, CC@ H volunteer Mary Levering described, with humor and grace, her 45-year career at the Library of Congress. Her professional advancement from newbie management intern in 1966 to key executive positions enabled her to detail the splendor, diversity and complexity of the world's largest and finest library.

Mary's photos of the Jefferson Building, opened in 1897, portrayed the Renaissance style beauty of the main Library of Congress structure. During the second half of the next century the rapid growth in the Library's holdings led to the construction of the more utilitarian Adams and Madison Buildings and soon the proliferation of satellite facilities (which continues to this day). The requirement that two copies of every publication anywhere be donated to the Library explains this explosive pace of development.

Early on, in 1975, Mary became a key coordinator of the Congressional Research Service. Its function is to answer any and all questions for members of Congress or their staffs, a legislative task that dovetails with the diversity of the Library's holdings. Mary and her colleagues oversaw the answers produced by the CRS staff of 3,000 experts.

Of special interest was Mary's later directorship of the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically handicapped. Through multiple regional centers, the Service provides materials in braille for the blind as well as "talking books," both equipment and cassettes, for folks with normal but fading vision. This service is great for people could no longer read a printed page.

Above all Mary's talk shed light on the Library's user-friendly character, whether by means of inter-library loans, shuttle deliveries from satellite storage, or the welcome of on-site researchers.

Though the Library's stacks (12 tiers in the Jefferson Building) were completely closed to all visitors about 25 years ago, she pointed out that even controlled access had led some scholars to misplace

items.

Mary Levering's career should inspire us all to treasure the devoted expertise of civil servants like herself.



Less-Known Services: Home Visits
