A NEW MODEL FOR HEALTH CARE

More than 45 members and neighbors came to CC Village Hall on the evening of March 21 to learn about the home health care program for frail seniors in DC initiated by Dr. Eric DeJonge, MedStar Washington Hospital Center. This grant-supported demonstration program with a staff of about 20 (physicians, nurses, technicians, home-care providers) delivers ongoing regular and specialized health care to more than 600 seniors in their homes, of whom about 10% require especially intense support. To date, hospitalizations are less frequent for this group and the cost of their care is significantly less than traditional medical practice models.

SPRING HOME SAFETY VISITS

The Spring Home Safety visits were a big success. CC@ H, in partnership with MC Fire & Rescue Service program, visited 39 homes (23 were non-members). Jim Resnick, Program Manager for Senior Outreach & Education of the Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Service, lead a team a

firefighters who completed the visits along with 11 CC@ H volunteers and staff. All members of CC@ H were contacted to see if they would like to participate in the program. Participants in Chevy Chase Village also received a security visit from a CCV police officer. Since the Spring of 2015, 124 homes have received a safety visit, including 81% of our Member's homes.

SCOUTS TO THE RESCUE



Local Scouts (BSA & Venturing Crew 255) assisted our Members on two separate occasions this past Spring. On March 25, a group of Scouts provided participating Members assistance with Spring prep and clean-up. Also, on April 21, scouts

ESPIONAGE: THE KGB AND THE CIA

David Duberman, a retired senior CIA officer, discussed two major espionage operations to a large and attentive audience at the Chevy Chase Village Hall on May 16. The first, a very successful KGB operation which lasted from the 1930s until the Cold War, was revealed in A Spy Among Friends: Kim Philby and the Great Betrayal, by Ben Macintyre; the other, The Billion Dollar Spy, by David E. Hoffman, recounted a major CIA achievement under very difficult conditions in Moscow. David used these operations to discuss espionage in general and other operations based on his personal experience. He emphasized that the KGB and its successor have decades of experience, that they are very capable and professional and that the operations they conduct today are very similar to those they conducted in the past. At the conclusion of the talk, David candidly answered many questions from the audience.
